ABSTRACT

The Pacific Crest Trail crosses what is arguably the greatest exposure of geology and tectonic features anywhere in the world. The trail is 2,658 miles from Mexico to Canada, crossing the states of California, Oregon and Washington. It Traverses the Peninsular and Transverse Ranges of Southern California, the San Andreas Fault three times, a portion of the Mojave Desert, up the Tehachapi's, along the backbone of the mighty Sierra, the Klamath Mountains of Northwest California and volcano hops through Oregon and Washington to the Canadian border. From the San Andreas Fault to the glaciated valleys of the Sierra Nevada to the tectonic origin of the Cascade Crest volcanoes, the trail crosses some of the most scenic, magnificent and geologically interesting terrain in North America.

Greg "Strider" Hummel and Paul "Nohawk" Hacker (H&H) met while hiking the Trail in 1977. Inspired by what they saw and experienced both returned to the "Real World" and became geologists. Come with us and take a 5 Million step adventure on the Pacific Crest Trail.
