# Don Clarke, Will Speak on Oil Exploration and Production in an Urban Environment

# Speaker Synopsis / Abstract

Don Clarke, a third generation Californian, was born in 1949 in Los Angeles. Raised in the San Fernando Valley, he was introduced to geology by his Junior High School science teacher. Don graduated from California State University, Northridge (CSUN) with his BS degree in 1972 and attended graduate courses at CSUN, CSU Long Beach, and CSULA. Don began his professional life in 1974 with the California State Lands Commission where he became an expert on the Wilmington Oil Field in Long In 1981, he joined the City of Long Beach Department of Oil Properties advancing to become the City's Division Engineer of Geology, Environment and Safety. Don is an acknowledged expert on the Wilmington Sequence Stratigraphy, Computer Mapping Techniques, and Geological Hazards with more than 50 papers on these subjects to his credit. He has and continues to lead field trips and conduct short courses for both AAPG and the PSAAPG and has presented papers internationally. Don is married to his wife Cynthia and has one child, a daughter, Holly.

The Los Angeles Basin has an extensive history of oil production. The cities within the basin have grown up around oil fields and continually encroaching field production limits over time. Oil production has greatly contributed to the prosperity of the region but few people even realize that a co-existence even exists. Oil is still an economic force in the area. For example, the Wilmington oil field that underlies portions of Long Beach produced 14,600,000 barrels of oil in 2002, seventy years after it's discovery. There are super giant oil fields in Long Beach, Signal Hill, Huntington Beach, and Santa Fe Springs. Oil development has not been without conflict and controversy

however. Many of the industry environmental regulations and restrictions on oil development were developed in the Loa Angeles basin. The future of urban oil development will likely be decided in the Los Angeles Basin. This presentation will focus on the co-existence of oil operations with urban and commercial development.



# LABGS Teacher of the Year Award Wins PSAAPG Award

Mike Fillipow, the LABGS 2003 award winner of Excellence in the Teaching of Natural Resources in the Earth Sciences, was recently awarded the Pacific Section AAPG Teacher of the Year. Mike is a science teacher for 11<sup>th</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup> grades at Long Beach Polytechnic High School.

Mike teaches geology classes as an upper division science elective. This class is open to all students attending Long Beach Poly. The goal of his course is to introduce geology to the students and provide an appreciation for the earth and its resources. Mike will receive \$250 from the LABGS to use in the school's science program or attend science conferences / training seminar. The LABGS entered Mike into PSAAPG Teacher of the Year 2003 award in May and he was named their recipient during the

PSAAPG meeting in Long Beach. For being named the PSAAPG TOTY, Mike was awarded \$500 and will be the PSAAPG entry into the national AAPG contest.

# Hi-lights of the 2003 Combined PS-AAPG / SEPM / SEG And WR-SPE Meeting

The 2003 Pacific Section of AAPG, SEPM and SEG held their Annual Meeting in Long Beach at the Hilton Hotel May 19 through the May 24, 2003. This year the meeting was combined with the Society of Petroleum Engineers Western Region annual meeting to provide multidisciplinary forum for the exchange of engineering and geoscience technologies and best practices. Most people agree this meeting provided a great venue to renew acquaintances, catch up on some of the latest technologies, adjust your thinking about petroleum engineering and the geosciences, and honor the geoscience profession and its special members.

#### Attendance

The total attendance at the meeting was 776. This includes, professionals, exhibitors, students, and registered spouses. From the planning point of view, the meeting was expected to attract between 850 and 900 persons. Not too bad considering the industry is currently in a travel lull. In the end, the convention committee analysis concluded the meeting was extremely successful from all points of view, exhibitor, attendee, presenter and vacationer.

#### **Technical Program**

The Technical Program was as strong as any in the past ten years. The Technical program Chair, John Cooper, compiled a strong blend of presentations, poster sessions spanning three days with over 120 geoscience papers (160 total papers).

#### **Field Trips**

The meeting kicked off with two excellent field trips. One examined the Channalized Turbidite Systems of the Miocene Capistrano Formation and the other traveled the Newport Inglewood Fault trend and examined the numerous oil fields adjacent to the fault. Both were well attended with the Newport Inglewood trend trip selling out. The meeting concluded in field trip sponsored by the Dibble Center examining the outcrops of the eastern San Gabriel Mountains and the Pomona Valley.

#### **Special Events**

Since all of the special events were included in the preregistration fees and onsite 3day registration, attendance was good. The icebreaker was held at the end of the first day of technical sessions and provided food and beverage to everyone in attendance. On Thursday, the all convention luncheon was held outside in the blistering hot LA sun (no complaints from Bakersfield residents) with a great motivational presentation by Olympic Gold Medallist Rafer Johnson. Thursday evening was sealed by the PSAAPG honors and awards reception which included plenty of food and beverage to honor those who standout in our profession. Lunch on Friday was provided to those wanting to get one last peak at the exhibits before closing down.
