Glenn Sharman, Ph.D. Candidate at Stanford University, Palo Alto, California

Will speak on: <u>Detrital Zircon Geochronology of the Late Cretaceous-Eocene</u>

<u>California Forearc: Implications for Margin Tectonism, Paleogeography, and the Offset History of the San Andreas Fault</u>

Abstract

Detrital zircon geochronology of Upper Cretaceous-Eocene forearc strata has led to exciting new constraints on the tectonic and landscape evolution of the western U.S. Synthesis of new and published detrital zircon U-Pb ages over a 2,000 km length of the southern Oregon-California-northern Baja forearc clearly demonstrates spatial and temporal changes in sandstone provenance that reflect evolving sediment dispersal patterns associated with the extinction of continental margin arc magmatism and transfer of deformation to the continental interior during latest Cretaceous-early Cenozoic Laramide low-angle subduction. Our detrital zircon provenance analysis of the well-preserved sedimentary successions of California and Baja California have yielded significant revisions of current paleogeographic and paleotectonic models, including a reappraisal of the early slip history of the San Andreas fault system.

Speaker's Biography

Glenn Sharman grew up in Delaware and did his undergraduate studies at Wheaton College (outside of Chicago, Illinois) where he received a B.S. in geology. He worked for a little over a year

as a field geologist with ENVIRON International Corporation, an environmental consulting firm based in Chicago. Glenn started graduate school at Stanford, and is currently in his 5th year working on a PhD. His research interests include using provenance relationships to understand regional paleogeography and paleoectonism in central California. He is also studying an outcrop exposure of a large mass-transport deposit exposed in coastal cliffs in New Zealand.
